From Fr. Bill

Is it a plant or a weed? I eventually discovered that weeds were plants that happened to be growing someplace they weren't wanted. Is it beef or a cow? You mean I'm eating Elsie? Although I realized that chickens were chicken, as a child I didn't realize that steak and ham-burger were parts of the animals who gave us milk and butter. This was my gateway into discovering the truth that the names we choose to call something becomes the lens of our reality for that thing. The words we use color how we perceive, react and respond to people and things.

One major problem we have in Los Angeles and much of California is usually referred to as the "homeless" problem. If homelessness is the problem, then the solution is relatively easy... build additional housing. I do grant there is an affordable housing issue for some in the working class and in retirement... and additional affordable housing does respond to that need. I do know one of our guests at the soup kitchen who found himself having to choose between his apartment and car. The car got him to work, providing for his clothing , food and medical... and so the car won.

But what if homelessness is more a symptom rather than the specific problem?

The men and women I see passed out in their own filth, in the park or in bushes along the street, aren't in this category. There was the woman pushing a shopping cart who claimed she had bought St. Jerome Church and was here to move into her new home. She does need help, but more than a bed can provide. There is the angel Gabriel and who wanted to know why Catholics kept Jesus nailed to the cross when He has truly risen from the dead. By the way, Gabriel so reeked of alcohol that he might have exploded if he got near an open flame.

Los Angeles has an obvious problem of people comfortable with living daily life loaded: drug and alcohol abuse. A percentage of these same people are struggling with various forms of mental illness.

Giving these individuals a bed isn't addressing the problem... in a sense we are enabling their addictions and supporting them in a life of staying high and self-medicated. A well-meaning "Safety Net" does protect them from hitting rock bottom. This safe haven can, for the mentally ill and addicted, become a snare. There needs are provided. "Why should I change?" Realize that not everything we call compassion is compassion.

Drug addicts need rehabilitation and a motive to go through the effort to change. People who are constantly drunk need rehabilitation and a motive to go through the challenges of learning to live a sober life. The mentally ill need counseling, care, perhaps medication and a safe place where they won't endanger themselves and others.

For these things to happen we need laws enforced to have consequences. No one should be above the law even if they are unfortunate enough to be a drug addict, an alcoholic or a petty thief.

Last Sunday one of our parishioners left her cell phone on a table after coffee and donuts, walking away to speak with someone. At her table (across from where she had been seated) was a new arrival to our neighborhood who arrived Saturday in a blanket for soup and clothing. When she wasn't looking (but others were) he pocketed her phone and took off. I chased him up Thornburn and La Tierra. I got within about 20 feet and then he turned on the jets and was out of sight by Alvern Circle. The police, beside saying I shouldn't have tried to capture him, said that the theft of the \$800 iPhone was only a misdemeanor and although we had a photograph of him... would not be pursued... unless he had a pattern of crimes in our neighborhood. No wonder the 99cent store has to have security guards at their doors.

We need police supported in their efforts to keep our neighborhoods safe and our businesses attractive. (Stores and neighborhoods with encampments blocking access and smelling fowl aren't doing well in LA.) If laws or enforcement practices are giving thieves free passes, we are well on our way to becoming communities where it isn't safe for people to go to the park or shopping. (I know places in LA where this is already true.) We need judges to get the addicted and consistently intoxicated the assistance they need. And people who are dangers to themselves and the community need a path to a different lifestyle, more than a soft pillow for the night. And, yes, we do need more affordable housing.

These are complex issues. The filth we step in, the stores people are concerned about approaching, the "illegal" fires which burn acreage and homes, the men and women and even children who view this as life... these are the symptoms of people being held down rather than lifted up.

Let us pray for those in positions of leadership to have the courage to be honest about the realities of LA's homelessness and deal with this complicated issue which directly or indirectly effects all our lives.
