From Fr. Bill

I hate that parents sometimes must bury their children.

The coffin was small enough to fit in the backseat of my corolla. The parents seated next to each other seemed apart and alone.

My memories of Christian are of him smiling and laughing. He was a very loving child who had special needs which required great sacrifice, patience and love. The demands of attentiveness, vigilance and care which he required during his twelve years of life had touched each of his immediate family members in a different way. Christian is the one who died, but for his parents, older brother and younger sister this means learning to live life differently as he is no longer the focal point of family life. I guess it is similar to experiencing the "empty nest syndrome." Now that this is over, what are we to do?

Caregivers hit this wall of grief, loss and guilt when their "patient" or family member dies. A complicated mix of happy they passed, guilty I feel happy, guilty I felt tired and angry about exhausting needs, regret about how sometimes I may not have been the most loving and patient to this person who did not choose this but was inflicted with this. It was too easy (even though I complained) for their journey of loss to become my life.

We are more than what we do. Men often have difficulties with this when they retire. And family caregivers can fall into void... the great nothing... when the need for their service comes to an end.

Don't allow yourself to become isolated. Stay connected with friends and family. Make time regularly to laugh, dance, cry and sing with people who strengthen your joy, peace and hope. Take advantage of programs which give you time to breath and actually find rest.

Keep Jesus and Mary close with you. Rather than focusing on "why me?" or on your difficulties make the time holy by lifting your heart and mind to God. Offering it up can be a powerful way to link our sufferings with the Lord, making Him more present to us and those we serve.

Respect Life Month challenges us to remember that we are called to advocate for, protect, support and serve not only the unborn who in some cases are viable and yet still murdered, but the elderly... the homebound... those in care facilities... those most in need of care.

Respecting life doesn't end with a child's birth. As a part of Respect Life Month we will be having speakers from "Foster All" on the weekend of October 20th and 21st. Children need loving homes where they may grow to be the men and women God would love them to be.

Save the date: Thursday, November 8th at 7pm. We will be having a special mass for "Good Father Gus."

Augustus Tolton was born a slave in Missouri. In 1862 his mother set out with her three little ones walking and rowing to freedom. Even though the family had escaped from physical slavery, the prejudice against Blacks in the North was not much better than in the South.

As a teen Gus began displaying an interest in the priesthood. His parish priests encouraged the young man and tried, without success, to enroll him in several diocesan seminaries. In 1878, the Franciscan College in Quincy accepted him as a student, and two years later he enrolled at the college for men studying to be missionary priests in Rome.

After completing his studies, Gus was ordained on April 24, 1886. Ordained to be a missionary, Gus was surprised to be told, "America needs Negro priests. If the United States has never seen a Black priest, it must see one now. Can you drink from this cup?" Newly ordained Father Tolton replied, "Yes, I can."

The archbishop of Chicago assigned Fr. Gus to a poor parish on the south side, Saint Augustine's Church, which consisted of a chapel in a basement. He spearheaded the building of Saint Monica's Church which was dedicated in 1894. This would be Father Gus' parish for life, and it became the center from which he ministered to all the Black Catholics of Chicago.

Fr. Gus had to take all the bigotry, all the insults, and keep his dignity, and the holiness of his priesthood. He helped Black Catholics be proud of their religion in spite of the weaknesses of some Catholics who couldn't free themselves of their prejudice. He was a devoted priest of Jesus Christ, who just happened to be Black.

On a very hot day in July, 1897, while walking home from a day of retreat, Fr. Gus collapsed on the sidewalk from a heat stroke. He was rushed to Mercy hospital where he died that night. He was only forty-three years old, a priest for more than eleven years.

The cause for Fr. Gus' beatification moved from diocesan level to the Vatican in 2010. In 2014 Fr. Augustus Tolton was declared a "Servant of God." If and when he is declared "Venerable" the church will recognize his virtue as heroic. For the process to advance Fr. Gus needs one confirmed miracle through his intercession to be declared "Blessed" and a second to become a canonized saint.

We can help by praying the special prayer for his canonization that simultaneously presents to God a request for healing or other special intention. We can share the story of Father Gus and encourage others to use him as one of their prayer warriors in the Communion of Saints as his process needs people asking for his interceding for them to God.

Next weekend is world Mission Sunday. We are called in a special way to be missionaries through prayer and participation in the Eucharist and by giving generously to the collection of the Society for Propagation of the Faith.

Your vote is your Voice in your Government. Qualifications to vote are: U.S. Citizen and a resident of California; 18 years on November 6th; not currently in state or federal prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony; not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court.

You must re-register if you have changed your name or moved out of your current voting precinct. Voter Registration forms must be postmarked or submitted electronically by **October 22, 2018**, in order to vote in the November 6th California Election.
