From Fr. Bill

When Jesus ascended into heaven, he did not send the Apostles out with copies of the New Testament. I know we speak about scripture being inspired, but who determined what writings would be considered sacred and inspired? Please note that being Christian was illegal, and the church established by Jesus Christ was under sporadic severe persecution throughout the Roman Empire during much of its first three hundred years.

The various books New Testament which we now have such easy access to, were chosen by the blood of martyrs. Realize before the printing press (1440) most books (including the bible) were hand written. Yes, scribes weren't just adversaries of Christ but had the job of reading, writing and copying correspondence and manuscripts. Therefore manuscripts (such as our sacred scriptures) were considered valuable, rare and precious. If your copy was destroyed or ruined, Amazon was not an option. Men spent their entire lives painstakingly copying the texts so that future generations would have an accurate copy of something they considered precious and sacred.

The apostles and those who had encountered Jesus were no longer around. The Roman Empire decided that one way to suppress Christianity was to eliminate all copies of our sacred texts. Obliteration of all writings and images of a person or people who had fallen out of favor was a common practice which the Romans had mastered with several hundred years of experience. Rewriting history is a common practice used from ancient times even to today. (Fahrenheit 451 explores this.)

We sometimes forget that Christianity spread into Africa during the lives of Christ and the Apostles. The Gospel of Luke records that Simon, a Cyrenian, was compelled to bear the cross for Jesus on the road to Calvary. Cyrene was located in North Africa. The book of Acts records that, on the day of Pentecost, Egyptians and Cyrenians were among the crowd, and heard the apostles proclaim the Gospel in their native languages. Acts (chapter 8) records the conversion of an influential Ethiopian eunuch to Christianity by the Deacon Philip. Finally, the book of

Acts records that following the apostles' missionary journey to Cyprus, new converts from Cyprus and Cyrene preached the Gospel to the Greeks of Antioch.

The Egyptian city of Alexandria (where the bible was first translated into Greek) boasted a very large Jewish community. It is believed that African Jews in Alexandria were converted from Judaism to Christianity following a Jewish revolt in A.D. 115 that all but extinguished Judaism from the region. Alexandria became one of the five hubs of Christianity: Rome, Constantinople, Alexandria, Antioch and Jerusalem.


North Africans were among the first to receive and embrace the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The early church in North Africa went through severe persecutions A.D. 64 thru 311. Many significant leaders of the faith emerged from the early African church including the well-known St. Augustine .

The Guardians of the Holy Scriptures are the over 200 men and women of North Africa who during these persecutions sacrificed their lives rather than turn over their community's manuscripts of the Christian Scriptures. We don't know their names but they so wanted others to know the "Good News" and to have access to the truth... that they were willing to have their own body burned at the stake rather than hand over the parts of the New Testament their own community treasured and used at the Eucharist.

St. Augustine (354-430)had high praise for those Guardians of the Holy Scriptures. The fourth-century Latin poet Prudentius wrote a hymn in their honor. One detail we have from the martyrdom of these Guardians is of a woman who was singing sacred songs to encourage those to be executed. She would not be silent and was shot with an arrow through the throat in the midst of an alleluia. (Would that all Christians could have the courage to sing!)

The next time you pick up a New Testament, know that you have this treasure because men and women gave up their lives for you to have it. Their feast day is February 11th.
